

From the Desk of Pastor Olsen: Lent Draws Near

The penitential season is right around the corner and will be here before you know it. "Remember you are from dust and to dust you shall return." These should be familiar words to you as they are the words spoken by the pastor as the ashes are placed on your forehead in the shape of the cross on Ash Wednesday. These words come down to us from God Himself following Adam's disobedience and his, and consequently ours as well, descent into sin. ¹⁷*"And to Adam he said, 'Because you have listened to the voice of your wife and have eaten of the tree of which I commanded you, 'You shall not eat of it,' cursed is the ground because of you; in pain you shall eat of it all the days of your life; ¹⁸thorns and thistles it shall bring forth for you; and you shall eat the plants of the field. ¹⁹By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread, till you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; **for you are dust, and to dust you shall return.**"* (Genesis 3:17-19 ESV)

The wonderful way in which God created Adam by bringing him forth from the dust of the ground and breathing life into Adam, now tells him that through sin, death has entered into the world. In one short swoop we have sin, death and the power of the devil on display as both Adam and Eve fell under Satan's temptations.

The message of repentance is not new to us nor to the church. Mark's Gospel records Jesus right at the beginning of His ministry, ¹⁴*"Now after John was arrested, Jesus came into Galilee, proclaiming the gospel of God, ¹⁵and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom*

of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel." (Mark 1:14-15 ESV) And it is also recorded in the Gospel of Luke following Jesus resurrection from the dead and appearing to His disciples. ⁴⁵*"Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures, ⁴⁶and said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, ⁴⁷and **that repentance and forgiveness of sins should be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem.**"* (Luke 24:45-47 ESV)

Paul in defense before King Agrippa at the end of the book of Acts speaks this truth, ¹⁹*"Therefore, O King Agrippa, I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision, ²⁰but declared first to those in Damascus, then in Jerusalem and throughout all the region of Judea, and also to the Gentiles, **that they should repent and turn to God, performing deeds in keeping with their repentance.**"* (Acts 26:19-20 ESV)

Repentance was no stranger to the early church during the time of the Apostles. St. Paul writes to the young pastor Timothy regarding the Office of the Holy Ministry. ²⁴*"And the Lord's servant must not be quarrelsome but kind to everyone, able to teach, patiently enduring evil, ²⁵correcting his opponents with gentleness. **God may perhaps grant them repentance leading to a knowledge of the truth, ²⁶and they may come to their senses and escape from the snare of the devil, after being captured by him to do his will.**"* (2 Timothy 2:24-26 ESV)

Repentance is not just an Old Testament issue, but clearly that was preached and taught by the early church as well. Space keeps me from illustrating how the early church following the Apostles continued in this truth, but I will skip ahead a moment to a little known monk from the 16th century. **“When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, 'Repent' [Matt. 4:17], he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance”** (Luther's Works, Vol. 31, p. 25). That pretty much says it all. I suppose my question is this: If repentance is of such that Jesus declared its necessity, the Holy Apostles writing under the inspiration of God declared it necessary in the Epistles, and then even the church beyond those days until now found it not only good but necessary, why is it that we truly no longer value that which God has so graciously given to us? Yes, repentance is a gift given by the Holy Spirit that we would humble ourselves before the Lord, confess our sins and seek that which only God in Christ Jesus can give, forgiveness. May this Lenten season of repentance find you not just waiting for Easter to come, but rejoicing in the gift of repentance that you may see what you have done or left undone to bring about such woe

and pain that our Savior willingly suffered for you, that His blood shed would cover all your sins and remove your guilt. I leave you with these two Lenten hymn verses from the great Lutheran theologian and hymn writer, Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676) that you may meditate upon them as the season of repentance approaches.

Upon the Cross Extended, LSB #453, vv. 3, 4.

- 3 Who is it, Lord, that bruised You?
Who has so sore abused You
And caused You all Your woe?
We all must make confession
Of sin and dire transgression
While You no ways of evil know.
- 4 I caused Your grief and sighing
By evils multiplying
As countless as the sands.
I caused the woes unnumbered
With which Your soul is cumbered,
Your sorrows raised by wicked hands.

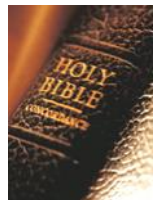

Mutual Consideration

Psalm 41:1-2

How close is your relationship with Jesus? According to Paul, "all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death," and "if we have been united with Him in a death like His, we shall certainly be united with Him in a resurrection like His" (Romans 6:3, 5). Your Baptism has brought you so close to Jesus that you share death, life, and all things with Him. Therefore, when David said of Jesus in Psalm 41:1, "Blessed is the one who considers the poor," he was also speaking of you. Your blessed Lord Jesus considers you—a poor, miserable sinner—and He will surely deliver you in the day of trouble so that you, too, will be "called blessed in the land" (Psalm 41:2).

Sustained in Sickness

Psalm 41:3

Since the fall into sin, no part of our human nature has escaped the ravages of original sin. Not only has sin separated us from God to our spiritual detriment, but our bodies, created for perfect health, endure sickness and injury. King David announces God's answer to this catastrophe in Psalm 41:3: "The LORD sustains him on his sickbed; in his illness You restore him to full health." This is a beautiful promise, but what does it mean for you and your infirmities? As all the Scriptures bear witness to Jesus, the gifts contained in these words are only revealed by your Baptism into Him by whose wounds we are healed.

February 28

I Have Sinned

Psalm 41:4

Our Lord Jesus Christ is the subject of all the Scriptures, both the Old and New Testaments. But some passages say puzzling and seemingly impossible things about Him. Consider Psalm 41:4: "O LORD, be gracious to me; heal me, for I have sinned against You." David, the writer of this psalm, was indeed a sinner who needed God's gracious forgiveness. How puzzling it is that we would apply this confession of sin to our sinless Lord! But Paul writes, "For our sake He made Him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:21). In your Baptism, your sinless Jesus has joined Himself to you and has fulfilled all the words that testify of Him.

March 6

Soon and Never

Psalm 41:5

King David's enemies said of him, "When will he die and his name perish?" (Psalm 41:5) Do you have enemies who wish the same fate on you? Regardless of your best efforts to "lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way" (1 Timothy 2:2),

you are pursued unceasingly by three dread adversaries: the world, the devil, and your own sinful flesh. When will you die? When will your name perish? Christ silences your foes and your fears and will strengthen and keep you firm in His Word and faith unto the end.

March 13 Empty Words **Psalm 41:6**

You are daily assailed by empty words: idle small talk, advertising slogans, and news reports that play on your fears. Political and business leaders spew cant, clichés, and spin. Perhaps even your friends and family get in on the act, betraying you with flattery and falsehoods. King David was only too familiar with such afflictions: “When one comes to see me,” he said, “he utters empty words, while his heart gathers iniquity; when he goes out, he tells it abroad” (Psalm 41:6). Our Lord’s powerful Word was David’s refuge from vain and malicious talk. It is

your refuge too. In Baptism, Jesus Christ has lifted you out of the verbal cesspool and placed you firmly on the rock of His Word. That Word is never empty, but it shall accomplish that which He purposes for you.

March 20 Vindication **Psalm 41:7-8**

In Psalm 41:7–8, David lamented, “All who hate me whisper together about me; they imagine the worst for me. They say, ‘A deadly thing is poured out on him; he will not rise again from where he lies.’” These words pointed forward to our Lord Jesus Christ, who rose again in defiance of His enemies. Do you have enemies who whisper and scheme against you? Have you been brought low—perhaps so low that you despair of ever rising again? Jesus was vindicated in His resurrection, and you shall be too. You can have certainty in your resurrection and vindication because Jesus Christ is risen.

An Update Specifically for You

We would like to bring you up to speed on a couple of things. The first item is the bell project. The 100-year-old bells from the Broadway church have been refurbished and returned to Emmaus (you can see them in the outbuilding). However, the cell/bell tower construction has been delayed due to changes in the process cell companies go through to approve adding service towers. Because of this delay, the \$58,000 grant we had from The Lutheran Foundation expired and was not renewed. However, we have received a loan from LCEF to make the final payment on the refurbishment. The loan will be re-paid in the short-term without using general church funds. Once the cell/bell tower is completed (12-18 months?) rental income from the tower will be used to repay the loan.

While the short-term bell loan is not expected to impact the general fund, the general fund does need our attention. During certain periods of the church year, Emmaus' attendance and overall giving declines, which has negatively impacted the church's finances. We understand that there are times when we cannot attend the regular service, but please keep in mind that the church's expenses continue even though we are not in attendance. However, there is an app to help with this, the Vanco app allows you to make your regular weekly contribution even if you are unable to attend the Sunday service.

It was also shared with you over the last several months that 53% of Emmaus' members did not make a supporting contribution to the church during 2022. While we are working on ways to improve this, it is important that we all give prayerful consideration to our financial support of Emmaus Lutheran Church. To borrow from Pastor Schopp – remember, the \$20.00 bill you put in the plate today doesn't go nearly as far as the \$20.00 dollar bill your grandparents put in the plate 40 years ago, or your parents put in the plate 20 years ago or even as far as the one you put in the plate three years ago.

Finally, the Emmaus Lutheran School is part of our Church mission. You can support this mission, and have some fun, by attending the upcoming A Night at the Races – the annual Dinner, Silent and Live Auction and Dancing. More information on this is included in this newsletter (see pg .

2. Lutheran Teacher Colloquy help to aid the tuition costs for each class taken.
3. Supply help to the school for Lutheran Schools Week project.
4. Preschool introductory packets and a tabletop light pad for student use.

These commitments totaled an additional estimated **\$2,350.00**.

Caring for My Neighbor

If any of the Ten Commandments might tempt us to think that keeping the Law is easy, it would be the Fifth Commandment. After all, how hard is it to get through life without murdering somebody? The vast majority of people can handle that!

But Jesus famously blows up this notion by pointing out that the command, “you shall not murder,” goes much deeper — down to the heart.

You have heard that it was said to those of old, “You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment.” But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, “You fool!” will be liable to the hell of fire. (Matt. 5:21–22)

Hatred and disdain come from the same sort of crookedness of heart as murder. With both murder and hatred, you look down on another person and think them of little worth.

In the Small Catechism, Luther also points out that every “do not” in the commandments also includes a “do this:” “We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body but help and support him in every physical need” (SC, Fifth Commandment, emphasis added).

We are not called merely to avoid evil; we must also do positive good.

So when Jesus drew near to us and became our neighbor by taking up our humanity, He came not only to avoid harming us, but He came to positively help us, bless us and serve us.

We are now called to show the love to our neighbors that Christ showed to us. Your neighbor is yet another gift that God has given you that requires your stewardship. We are called to show mercy, to be kind, to love and serve our neighbor. One aspect of this stewardship is financial: our neighbors need us to support the church’s work so that they can hear the Gospel and come to faith. Our neighbors need the church’s alms and mercy work. Our neighbors need our faithful service in all we do in the name of Christ

[Mom Fights in Court after State Denies Adoption Due to Her Christian Beliefs](#) *Alliance*

Defending Freedom, Portland Oregon

Alliance Defending Freedom attorneys representing an Oregon mother of five who wishes to adopt siblings under the age of 10 from foster care, filed a notice of appeal to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit Wednesday after a lower court ruled against her. Oregon state officials categorically excluded Jessica Bates from the adoption process because she refused to speak or act against her belief that boys and girls are biologically different and should cherish that difference, not reject it.

ADF attorneys are asking the 9th Circuit to allow Bates to access Oregon's adoption system free of discrimination while her lawsuit continues so that she can provide a loving home to children in need. "No state should abandon children in favor of a dangerous ideological agenda," said ADF Legal Counsel Johannes Widmalm-Delphonse. "Jessica is a loving mother who feels called to adopt siblings under the age of 10 from foster care. But the state of Oregon is categorically excluding her from adopting any child because Jessica shares a view held by millions of Americans: that boys and girls are biologically different and should cherish that difference, not reject it.

Because Jessica will not promote Oregon's radical gender ideology to children under the age of 10, the state considers her an unfit parent and has deprived hundreds, if not thousands, of children in Oregon's system of the opportunity to be raised in a loving home. We urge the 9th Circuit to allow Jessica to continue her adoption journey and provide a loving home to children in need."

Bates began the process of applying to become certified to adopt children from foster care last year. The Oregon Department of Human Services, the agency responsible for overseeing the state's child welfare programs, denied her application because Bates would not agree to say and do things that conflict with her faith, like facilitating a child's access to dangerous drug interventions that block their natural, biological development, taking children to Pride parades, or using pronouns inconsistent with a child's sex.

Although Jessica repeatedly told ODHS officials that she would happily love and accept any child placed with her, officials still rejected her application, making her ineligible to adopt any child—even children who share Jessica's religious beliefs. ODHS's policy needlessly penalizes Bates and many other people of faith for their religious views, compels parents to speak words that violate their conscience, and deprives religious families of equal protection of the law because of their faith.

Bates, who lost her husband in a car collision six years ago, is a mother of five children, ages 10 to 18. Inspired by the story of a man who adopted a child from foster care, Bates felt a calling to follow the biblical teaching to care for orphans. State officials, however, rejected her application because she refused to abandon her religious beliefs. Rebekah Schultheiss is serving as local counsel on behalf of Bates.

[Supreme Court Will Hear Case to Ban Mail-Order Abortions, Save Babies from Dangerous Abortion Pills](#) *Steven Ertelt*

The Supreme Court on Wednesday said it will hear a case on whether to uphold the ruling from a federal appeals court that banned mail-order abortions and protects women from dangerous abortion pills.

As LifeNews reported previously, in April the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals issued a ruling that banned mail-order abortions that put women's lives at risk, condemned the improper FDA approval process for the drug and restored strict limits on the drug meant to protect women's health that the Biden administration removed.

By illegally approving chemical abortion drugs, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration failed to abide by its legal obligations to protect the health, safety, and welfare of girls and women. The FDA never studied the safety of the drugs under the labeled conditions of use, ignored the potential impacts of the hormone-blocking regimen on the developing bodies of adolescent girls, disregarded the substantial evidence that chemical abortion drugs cause more complications than surgical abortions, and eliminated necessary safeguards for pregnant girls and women who undergo this dangerous drug regimen.

The appellate court said the FDA's faulty decision to approve the abortion drug could stand because too much time had passed since it was approved — even if that approval process was problematic. The maker of the dangerous abortion drug appealed along with the Biden administration.

Today, the nation's highest court said it will take the case.

Alliance Defending Freedom Senior Counsel Erin Hawley, told LifeNews she is glad SCOTUS will hear this important case and expects the lower court decision to be upheld.

"Every court so far has agreed that the FDA acted unlawfully in removing common-sense safeguards for women and authorizing dangerous mail-order abortions. We urge the Supreme Court to do the same. The FDA has harmed the health of women and undermined the rule of law by illegally removing every meaningful safeguard from the chemical abortion drug regimen. Like any federal agency, the FDA must rationally explain its decisions. Yet its removal of common-sense safeguards—like a doctor's visit before women are prescribed chemical abortion drugs—does not reflect scientific judgment but rather a politically driven decision to push a dangerous drug regimen."

Ingrid Skop, M.D., F.A.C.O.G., a board-certified OB-GYN who serves as Vice President and Director of Medical Affairs at Charlotte Lozier Institute, shared her reaction. She told LifeNews that the case is vital because abortion pills kill and injure women.

"As a practicing OB-GYN with over 30 years of experience, I have seen first-hand what the abortion pill regimen has done to my patients, both mother and child. As many as one in five women will suffer a **complication** such as hemorrhage or infection, and I have cared for many of these women in the ER. The Biden administration's decision to weaken commonsense safeguards and remove doctors from the process shows they prioritize abortion on demand over the mother's safety. I hope the Supreme Court realizes that the lives of many babies and women are at risk. The FDA must be held accountable for its callous actions." To read more on this article go to lifenews.com

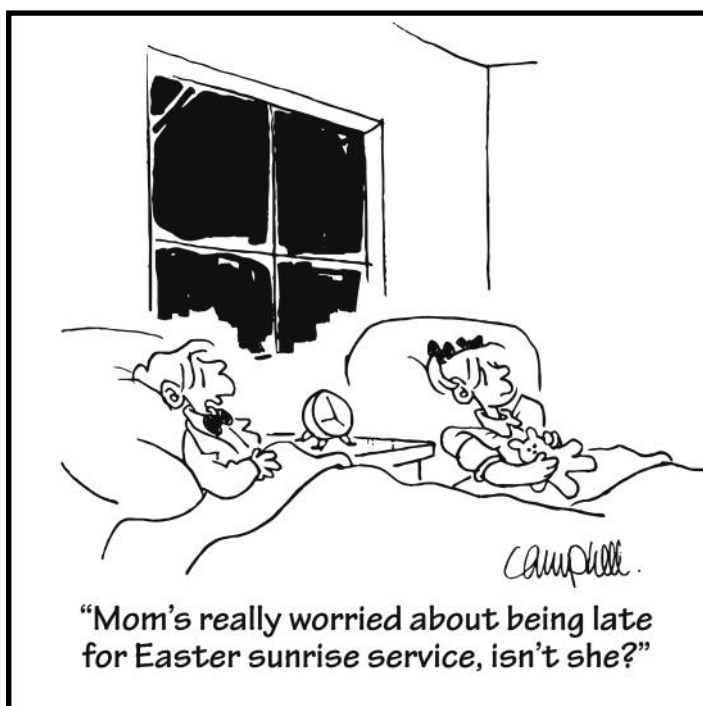
