#### **Changing the Ending**

Did you ever want to stop the movie you are watching before it gets to an end because you just know how this is going, and it is not going to be good? Have you watched a show for some time, either binge watch or worse yet, have watched for years and you don't want to watch the final episode because you just know it is not going to end well for your favorite characters? Or the boy won't get the girl. Or the bad guy is going to get away and the cowboy with the white hat won't get to ride off into the sunset?

If you could just stop the movie. If you could just not watch the final episode, then maybe, just maybe in your mind, that bad ending never happened. If you stop reading in time, maybe Romeo and Juliet will get to be together, alive that is. Or maybe if you just stopped watching, Han Solo is still alive, and he wasn't mu0rdered by his own son. (Star Wars spoiler alert.) If somehow our imagination was more powerful than the reality, we could turn back the clock, make time stop, or change the ending. If only...

Try as I might, there is no way that I can possibly picture in my head how it must have been for those disciples and followers of Jesus on that Good Friday. John stands, the only disciple there, at the foot of the cross throughout the entire event, even unto Jesus' death, "So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first, and of the other who had been crucified with him. But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. But one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once there came out blood and water. He

who saw it has borne witness--his testimony is true, and he knows that he is telling the truth--that you also may believe." (Joh 19:32-35 ESV) **Surely John would have turned the clock back, even 24 hours if he could**.

Jesus' mother witnesses all of it. It has been said that no parent should have to see the death of their child, and yet could there be a more horrific death of your child than what Mary had to behold? Indeed, a sword would pierce her soul as was predicted when Jesus was just a tiny baby. The utter horror Mary had to behold and yet she stayed. She did not leave her son. Certainly, we do not pray to Mary but might we for a moment recognize the strength of this mother to stay

with her child. If anyone would have wanted to stop time, to turn it back or have a different ending it certainly would have been this mother, the very mother of the Son of God!

And what about those who ran away? What about Peter who denied Jesus and wept bitterly? What about those other disciples, apart from Judas of course, who were afraid for their own lives? If they could have turned back the clock or have stopped the "movie" or rewritten the ending, they probably would have done so. Fearful that they would be next, one can only imagine not just fear, but pain, loneliness, maybe even the guilt of not being there or doing anything to stop this. What agony they also must have felt in such a moment.

What about some of those other men, men who took part in Jesus' burial, men often forgotten about, but willingly dealt with Jesus lifeless body? "After these things Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate that he might take away the body of Jesus, and Pilate gave him permission. So he came and took away his body. Nicodemus also, who earlier had come to Jesus by night, came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-five pounds in weight." (Joh 19:38-39 ESV)

The burial was necessary. What a horrible and terrible circumstance we would be in if the clock was turned back. How terrifying it would be if this event on Calvary did not take place. How utterly frightening it would be were the Son of God not to hang on that cross and make full payment, the perfect atoning sacrifice made once and for all time. If they had stopped "the movie," changed the script, or not let it play out as it needed to play out, we would be lost forever in our sin. We would face the eternal torment of Hell where the fire is never quenched, the devil would go on unchecked, and death would go undefeated bringing more destruction that it already had since the fall into sin.

It had to happen, and it had to happen this way. It was completely necessary that the Scriptures should be fulfilled. Two men were walking along the road to a certain town about seven miles away when a stranger appeared to them along the way. He inquired of what happened and their response tells all, "But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel." (Luk 24:21 ESV) They had hoped, but their hope was gone. They thought Jesus would redeem Israel, to restore, to free Israel once and for all. But you see this Jesus is dead. This is where they were on that first East-

er morning. The pain and hopelessness were still there.

This word "redeem" is used only in two other places in the New Testament. One of those speaks volumes to what had to happen and why the payment price was high, so high that it cost the life of the very Son of God Himself. St. Peter records in his first letter, "you were ransomed (redeemed/bought back) from the futile ways inherited from your forefathers, not with perishable things such as silver or gold, but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot." (1Pe 1:18-19 ESV) His blood had

to be spilled. His death had to happen. **His complete atoning work was necessary.** By the blood of this very lamb, a lamb without blemish or spot, the perfect Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world, you have your pardon and peace.

Those men along that road to Emmaus thought the hope died with Jesus, but they were wrong! Praise be to God that it did happen. Praise be to God that the clock wasn't turned back. Praise be to God that "we kept watching," because it was absolutely necessary that it all take place as it did so that full payment would be made for your sin!

As we approach Good Friday, a blessed and most holy day, we cannot get anywhere near to what these family members, disciples and followers of Jesus felt. There are no number of movies or series that is going to be able to recreate what happened on that necessary day. We would not have understood what was going on nor the need for it to happen more than they did. But what we do know is that sacrifice, that blood was poured out and freely shed for you. The one that stayed, the one that watched His Savior and your Savior, die gave us these words by way of the Holy Spirit for our peace, our comfort and our confidence, "if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous. He is the propitiation for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world." (1Jo 2:1-2 ESV)

even end three days later. The story did not end when He ascended, or on Pentecost. As a matter of fact, the story, His story, continues until He returns on that last day when we, with those who have come before us, shall rise again and live forever bodily in the presence of God almighty. For those who are in Christ, there truly will be a "happy" ending the likes of which we have never seen, nor can we imagine. Until then, live safe and secure in the knowledge that you have died with Him, and you have risen with Him in the blessed waters of Baptism. Praise be to God that He did not change "the ending." AMEN.


