From the desk of Pastor Olsen:

A New Season

What a blessed time in the Church Year Calendar: Advent, Christmas and Epiphany! As we begin the new calendar year for the church season, we give thanks to God for those who have gone before us to give us this gift. We often don't think of a calendar as a gift. We have been given many gifts from those who have come before us that we often do not realize or give thanks. Having this calendar helps us focus our attention away from the worldly things and onto the that which matters most, Jesus Christ and His work for our salvation.

Advent brings us to mind the coming of the Savior, both in the incarnation and His return on the last day. His coming in the flesh to inaugurate the end time, to bring us a hope, a light into the world, to bring us a peace that is based both on the promises of Christ fulfilled and the promises yet to come, the Day of Redemption when He returns. None of this happens if Christ does not come in the flesh to take our place, to fulfill the Law for us and to sacrifice Himself.

The full promises of God are hidden in a young mother's womb. How often we forget this and just look to the manger, but there for nine months is true God and true man! **The salvation of the world grows inside of a simple woman, who was willing to serve as she was asked.** True, the birth of the Savior brings angels and songs, shepherds and kings, but we would be amiss to not pay attention to the living God not just lying in the manger, but the one growing, as any baby does, in total helplessness and dependence upon His mother.

This too is the joy of Christmas, that God would send His Son into such suffering, into such utter dependence. For what is more dependent upon others than a newborn baby? It has no way to care for itself at all. If it were not for others, the baby doesn't even exist, let alone survive to the point where it can grow and care for itself as an adult. This is the way that God chose to send His Son, utter dependence and utter helplessness. The Son of God born and placed in the manger truly is one of us.

Christmas time in the calendar, while rather short, gives us time to rejoice in this newborn king. Helpless though He may be, He is still the Lord of heaven and earth, come down to humble Himself, born of a virgin Mary, suffer and die, to rise again on the third day for our salvation, for your salvation.

And finally, we move into the Epiphany season, a season of wonders in the making of the manifestation of God in the flesh. Epiphany is both a day, January 6, and a season. It is a season of light, a season of manifestation of the revelation of God in Christ Jesus. We see wise men appear to worship the child. We behold the Baptism of Jesus and end the season



with His Transfiguration on the last Sunday before the Lenten season begins. History dates Epiphany all the way back to the third century. Along with Easter and Pentecost, Epiphany was one of the highest days of the Church Year! Were that it was seen as such today. Rather, many look at it as a placeholder between Christmas and Lent.

But here we witness the glory of the God revealed in the Word made flesh and dwelt amongst us. The glory of God is revealed in His Baptism. The glory of God is revealed as He performs that first miracle at the wedding in Cana. And His glory is revealed on a mountain top, where He tells His disciples to tell no one what has happened in this moment of transfiguration.

This prepares us for the glory that is to be revealed in that final week of Jesus' life through His sham of a trial, the betrayal of those closest to Him and His utter humiliation and lonesome work on the cross culminating with His death. It was a bloody and violent end to bring peace the only way that it could have come, the lone atoning work of the Son of God for the forgiveness of sins.

So, give thanks for these upcoming, blessed seasons, *not winter and spring*, although we should be thankful for them as well. **Give thanks for the season of Advent, the season of Christmas, and the season of Epiphany, of light and the manifestation of the Son of God, the glory of the Father through the Son.**

See His glory helpless in a young woman's womb.

See the glory in the manger fit not for a king, but for animals.

See the child being brought to the temple for His circumcision.

Watch as the Holy Spirit descends from heaven and the Father speaks, "This is my Son in whom I am well pleased."

And observe the glory of Christ, if just for a moment, on a mountain with Peter, James and John as witnesses to a wondrous event.

However, it will not compare to the wondrous event on another hill far away outside the city walls. But that is for another season of the Church. **Come and see the glory of the Father through the Son and given to us with eyes of faith by the Holy Spirit. Come see the Advent of our God.**

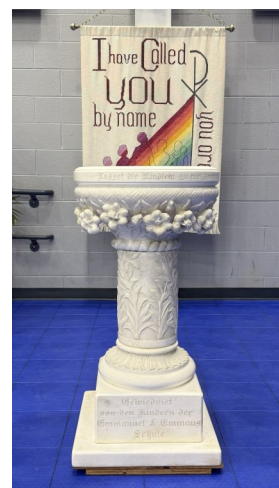
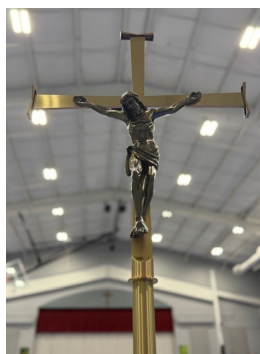
Looking to the Past

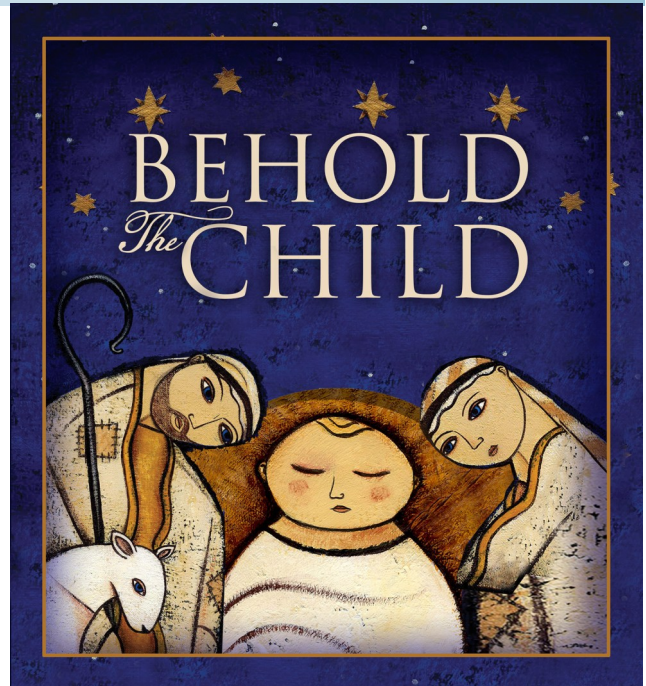
