

From the Desk of Pastor Olsen: The Unseen

I am at my computer, following our Monday morning chapel and Thanksgiving (break), still musing on giving thanks. As I visited Bill Schmidt in the hospital on the Friday following Thanksgiving, a nurse was wearing a Christmas shirt already. I remarked to her that it is just the day after Thanksgiving and she was already on to Christmas. In response she said, "Thanksgiving is gone. We don't need to give thanks anymore." Sure, this was said in jest, I hope, but it got me to thinking, do we need to give thanks anymore? Does Christmas come along, and thanks is forgotten? As I sit by the bedside of Mr. Schmidt it occurs to me that thanksgiving is not over. It is never over.

Our Post-Communion Canticle reminds us right after receiving the very body and blood of Christ, "Thank the Lord and sing His praise..." It occurs to me as I watch the nurses that there is much to thank God for in that hospital. As I walk back to my car, it occurs to me to be thankful that I *can* walk out of the hospital. It occurs to me to be thankful when I get home, that my wife has prepared a plate for my dinner to heat up. It occurs to me to be thankful for the people who have come to sit with Mr. Schmidt at the hospital, to care for a brother in Christ.

It occurs to me to be thankful for those who are unseen on a Sunday morning who have done what is necessary to prepare for worship, such as the set-up crews. Where would we be if not for these unseen people. It occurs to me to be thankful because the sanctuary doesn't just magically appear on Sunday morning, although that would be pretty cool. It occurs to me to be thankful that the preparation for Holy Communion and, might I say the clean up as well, happens by unseen people


who take great care to handle these sacred vessels in a good and proper manor. It occurs to me to be thankful for the decorations around the building that when I show up there is Christmas everywhere. I am guessing it is not one of Santa's helpers, but a few people who take A LOT of time to share their gifts and talents with all of us. And there are many more unseen servants in the church, but I only have so much room in the newsletter!

It just occurs to me that thanksgiving is not over. The unseen people who serve willingly and joyfully are a blessing to me and to all of us. Praise be to God for these people. We never thank them enough. And especially are we thankful during this Advent season, the season of preparation, the season of anticipation, for a very special child, true God and true Man, who spent nine months unseen. This is the Savior of the world. This is the one who came to take your sin and my sin away. Unseen that He was, He was still God of God, light of light, very God of very God!

So much to be thankful for beyond just one day or one weekend in a year. And besides, who knows, by the time you read this my first grandchild may be born. (When does one get used to saying that?) I have held many children in the hospital but to hold my granddaughter soon must be something to give thanks. Which reminds me, I am thankful for the faithful grandparents in our congregation who have, and still are, showing me how to be a good grandfather. I am most definitely thankful for them!



The Measure of Our Generosity

If you open up the Small Catechism, you'll find a shortened version of the Third Commandment: "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy." But if you look up the list of the Ten Commandments in Exodus, you'll find the full version:

Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Ex. 20:8–11)

Why did Luther shorten this commandment for the Small Catechism? Was it so that the kids wouldn't have so much to memorize? No, it was because Luther knew that all the details of the Third Commandment were part of the "shadow" of the Old Testament (Col. 2:16). Or as St. Paul puts it, there is "letter" in the Old Testament law and "spirit" (2 Cor. 3:6). The details of not working on Saturday were fulfilled by Christ. That part of the Sabbath regulation no longer applies. But the spirit of the law does remain: We need to dedicate sufficient time each week to hearing God's Word and giving it honor and respect. Or as Luther sums it up in the Small Catechism's explanation to the Third Commandment: "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it."

The same sort of analysis applies to our giving. In the Old Testament, God commanded the Israelites to give a tenth of their income to the Levites so that those men could dedicate their lives to serving in God's house, teaching the people, conducting worship, etc. In the New Testament, there is a rigid requirement listed about handing in your tax forms to church to make sure you've given enough. But the mandate to have a full-time ministry, which is the spirit of that law concerning tithing to the Levites, is right there in 1 Corinthians 9:14: "The Lord has ordained that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel."

The New Testament church's job is significantly larger than the job of Old Testament Israel. We are commanded to preach the Gospel to all nations. There was only the temple to maintain in the Old Testament, but we have churches, schools, universities and seminaries, plus missionaries everywhere. So you tell me: Can we really undertake the work of the ministry if our giving doesn't even measure up to Old Testament levels of generosity?

There is no after-school tutoring from December 18-21 due to semester exams.


Religious Liberty: Free to be Faithful: A religious liberty education and awareness campaign from The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod

Equipping Lutherans to be Gospel-Motivated Voices for Life

“Researchers experimented on 1,000 embryos leftover from IVF” *by Nancy Flanders*

Scientists used nearly 1,000 human embryos donated to research following a separate IVF study in order to experiment on them in the hope of improving the success rate of In Vitro fertilization (IVF).

During the study, it was learned that half of the embryos — about 500 — stopped developing due to genetic issues in early development. Study author Rajiv McCoy, an assistant professor of biology at Johns Hopkins University, believes that this is the same rate at which embryos stop developing in natural conception as well. Researchers think that this knowledge could allow more embryos to be successfully created during the practice of IVF — which could mean more embryos left perpetually frozen along with the estimated one million who are currently frozen. Research has shown that IVF destroys human embryos at a higher rate than abortion does.

McCoy explained, “It is very surprising that most of these embryo arrests are coming not from errors in egg formation, but from errors happening in cell divisions after fertilization. The fact that these errors don’t come from the egg suggests that maybe they could be mitigated by changing the way IVF is done.”

Johns Hopkins, along with London Women’s Clinic researchers in the UK, compared the embryos that stopped developing within a few days of fertilization with those that continued to develop. They found that some embryos begin to develop properly with the maternal genetic material before ceasing to develop once the embryo’s genes take over. The embryos who did not survive began with the typical 46 chromosomes like those who did survive but then passed down incorrect numbers of chromosomes as the cells continued to divide. “It doesn’t really matter if you have extra missing chromosomes in the very beginning because the maternal machinery is controlling things,” McCoy said. “When the embryo’s genome turns on, that’s when things go wrong.”

According to Medical Xpress, human embryos can experience high rates of chromosome gain and loss, referred to as aneuploidy, early on in development. Aneuploidy is understood to be a contributor to early miscarriage, and fertility clinics will often refuse to implant them. However, it has recently been discovered that such embryos can actually self-correct and continue to develop in the womb.

The researchers want to run further testing on specific cells from the embryos who stopped developing in order to trace the chromosomes’ origins to either maternal or paternal genetics. They also want to learn if the chemical composition of the dish in which the human embryos are kept could be harming or killing the embryos.

“The problem could be that the chemical composition of the culture medium that are commonly used will not allow all embryos to grow, that the abnormal cell divisions are due to stresses on the

egg and early embryo that causes the abnormal divisions associated with chromosome abnormalities,” said study co-author Michael Summers, a Senior Consultant at London Women’s Clinic.

IVF is carried out 2.5 million times a year around the world, but each year only 500,000 babies are actually born from the IVF procedure, according to research published in Reproductive Biomedicine Online. That means that each year, if just one embryo is created during each IVF cycle (the average is seven), at least 80% — at least two million — of the human beings created through IVF either die during the process, are frozen indefinitely, or are destroyed. *Correction, 10/17/23: This article was updated to reflect that the embryos were donated to researchers following a separate IVF study.*

[“Premature Twins Set Record at Cleveland Clinic, Surviving at Just 22 weeks”](#) by Victoria Bergin

Due to advances in modern medicine, premature babies are surviving at higher rates and earlier delivery dates. Kimyah and DJ Jackson set a record at Cleveland Clinic as the youngest surviving premature twins when they were born at 22 weeks. When their mother Kimberly went to the hospital clearly in the early stages of labor, she was told that they had a 10-20% survival rate. Her doctors did everything they could to stop her labor, but they were unsuccessful.

“We closely work with the families in these situations to come to a decision on whether they would like comfort care or full resuscitation efforts. Kimberly wanted us to do everything we could for her twins,” said Dr. Firas Saker, the medical director of Cleveland Clinic NICU at Hillcrest Hospital. The twins did need to be resuscitated and intubated, but they survived. They were each about the size of a soda can: Kimyah weighing in at 12 ounces, and DJ at 15 ounces. Due to the high level of risk, the twins were rushed to the NICU and Kimberly only got a glimpse of Kimyah, anxiously thinking, “She’s too small.”

The family spent the next 138 days in the hospital. At first, Kimberly wasn’t even able to hold her newborn babies because their skin was so fragile. There were many ups and downs during those months, but the twins were finally released and are developing well at almost one year old. The staff that cared for them celebrated their “graduation” and even made a heartwarming video.
