One of my favorite Easter hymns is 487, “Come, you faithful, raise the strain.” When I think of the imagery of the Easter season, what comes to mind is the light of the morning sun bursting through the doors of a dark prison cell. That is what we celebrate this Easter season!

Our modern Christian society tends to view sin exclusively in the sense of individual choice – “I (or we) commit sin.” And surely, this is correct – but that’s not the whole story. Original sin is not just something in *me* that affects the world through my deeds. Paul writes in Ephesians to Gentile Christian converts living in a pagan society, and he says, “*And you were dead in the trespasses and sins in which you once walked...following the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience*” (Eph 2:1). We see here that sin is a force of the Devil that has infected the very air that we breathe, and this polluted, infected air causes the greatest of all diseases – death itself.

I love this hymn for the typology – which is a biblical idea of Old Testament figures reflecting New Testament realities. The hymn writer, John of Damascus, was a monk living near Jerusalem in the eighth century. He writes (kindly translated into English for us),

*Loosed from Pharaoh’s bitter yoke,
Jacob’s sons and daughters
Led them with unmoistened foot
Through the Red Sea waters.*

Pharaoh was not just a really bad Old Testament ruler. No! He was the very image of the oppression of sin, death, and the Devil. Yes, the Israelites were infected with sin and they were sinful, but under Pharaoh, they were utterly oppressed, incapable of freeing themselves. We cannot let our modern views of human will and

power make us forget that sin is a power that, apart from Christ, has us utterly captive and enchained.

*In the final stanza, we sing,
Alleluia! Now we cry
To our King immortal,
Who, triumphant, burst the bars
Of the tomb’s dark portal.*

In the Easter Vigil service, we see this imagery of freedom and light bursting forth before our very eyes. The service begins in darkness, outside the sanctuary, the space usually lit only by candles. The congregation processes into the dark nave and sits through a long service of readings and prayer. The service I attended this year in Pennsylvania began at 8pm, and by the third hour, our eyes began to grow heavy. But then, all at once, we were shocked awake by the change: the pastor proclaimed in a loud voice, *Alleluia! Christ is Risen!*

At this point, the lights in the sanctuary bursted on, the organ began at full blast, and the black paraments were quickly stripped away to reveal the *Alleluia*. The congregation was all given small bells that we rang continuously (at a near-deafening pitch!) as the pastor and his assistants redressed the altar for Holy Communion. I felt more awake than ever.

When Saint Peter writes that Christ *preached the gospel even to those who are dead* (1 Pet 4:9), this is what I picture! The sanctuary was held in a suffocating darkness, mirroring the darkness of the sinful condition, bound in sin and unable to commune with God. Everything that Jesus did was to crush the enemy and, in this way, utterly banish darkness. He took back the world that Satan, the world’s Pharaoh, held in bondage. Christ subjugated all cosmic powers of evil under His feet.

And so, dear Christian, when Satan is oppressing you, remember that your Baptism makes you also a participant in Christ's victory over Satan's greatest weapon, death. And His victory still comes to you, in a way you can *taste and see!* Because, as you know, death always seeps back into our life. Yet, even as you live awaiting your final freedom, His victorious presence is with you – in the operating room, at the graveside, in the pits of depression .

I hope you are able to sing with us this Eastertide, with *true affection* as John of Damascus writes (stanza 3), the beautiful hymn words:

*For today, among His own,
Christ appeared, bestowing
His deep peace, which evermore
Passes human knowing.
Neither could the gates of death,
Nor the tomb's dark portal
Nor the watchers nor the seal
Hold Him as a mortal .*



An Update Specifically for You

We would like to update you on a couple of things from last month's voter's meeting. First, the attendance, open conversation and feedback we had was most appreciated. As was the tolerance of the loong Treasurer's report. We are working to modify our financial reporting methods and frequency based on the feedback from this meeting, thus the "under construction" notice in the Weekly News and Notes. Our goal is to reformat the reports and communication methods to help the members of Emmaus better understand where our Church, School and Pre-School is with its financials.

We also discussed the need for funds to bridge the gap between vouchers, especially the May to November period. Opportunities mentioned include possible employer match for donations to the school and/or pre-school and community grants from places such as Kroger (see News and Notes) and Walmart.

At the meeting it was also announced that we had received a member commitment to match up to \$50,000 in special contributions through June of this year. Given the timing of the commitment and from a suggestion made at the meeting, this campaign has been labeled "**Bridging the \$50,000 Match Gap**". There is additional information about this campaign elsewhere in this newsletter and will be in the weekly News and Notes.

As we move forward with our Bridging the Gap campaign, we are ever reminded of the most important gap of all, the one covered by our Savior's innocent suffering and death for our sin. Jesus bridged the gap between us and our heavenly Father, as only He could do. Our forgiveness is won for us, salvation is secured and we are reconciled to the Father through the blood bought merit of Jesus Christ. Not needing to bridge the gap in that respect anymore, we have the gift of being charged with the stewardship of these gifts at Emmaus as God has graciously given them to us. Journey to the Cross

Whose Is It Anyway?

If you have ever bought or sold a house, you are acquainted with the concept of a “title search.” Before you can sell your house, and before anyone else will feel comfortable putting down the money to buy it, you have to prove that you really own it. So a title company looks through the public records to ensure that you bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it before that, all the way back to the earliest records of your state, including when your state was only a territory or colony of England.

Peak into a preschool classroom during playtime and you’ll see a simplified version of this. A child starts playing with a ball, but another child says, “That’s mine: I had it first.”

You can’t understand the Seventh Commandment without understanding this concept of ownership or title. As the Small Catechism puts it:

You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor’s money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.

Your neighbor’s possessions are his: you don’t have a right to take them. And likewise, your possessions are yours. Ownership and property rights are foundational to any functioning society.

But there is something deeper to know about ownership, and that is the question of who has the title and ownership to you? Paul says, “Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price” (1 Cor. 6:19–20).

If you yourself are owned by God, then of course everything that you own, you really only possess by God’s leave: all of it, at bottom, belongs to Him since you belong to Him. For you were bought with the blood of Christ.

This notion is the foundation of all Christian stewardship. It all belongs to God. It should all be used for things that bring honor to His name, blessings to our neighbors and the extension of His kingdom.


Concordia DECA Students Fare Well at State Competition



[Tennessee House Committee Approves Bill Requiring Fetal Development Video in Schools.](#)

The Tennessee House Education Instruction Committee **approved** a bill on Tuesday that would require that public schools include an approved preborn child development ultrasound or computer animation as part of the state-required family life curriculum.

House Bill 2435 lists Live Action's "Meet Baby Olivia" as an example of a computer animation that would meet the bill's requirements. Schools could choose to show a different three-minute animation or high-resolution ultrasound, according to the bill's sponsor, Rep. Gino Bulso. If this bill is signed into law, schools will begin using fetal development videos in the 2024-2025 school year.

A similar bill was **enacted** in North Dakota last year, and others have also been introduced in West Virginia, Kentucky, Virginia, Missouri, and Iowa. The bills, along with the "Baby Olivia" video itself, have come under heavy **attack** from pro-abortion groups. The Associated Press **painted** the video as a pro-life political move, and used pro-abortion sources to attempt to discredit the video. However, "Baby Olivia" has the backing of medical experts and was created using detailed "award-winning content" from the Endowment for Human Development (EHD). EHD is a self-described "nonprofit organization dedicated to improving health science education and public health" which is "committed to **neutrality** regarding all controversial bioethical issues." Its **website** states that its "board of directors, board of advisors, staff, and volunteers includes accomplished educators, researchers, authors, programmers, and clinicians from a variety of scientific and business disciplines who share the common goal of improving lifelong health through prenatal development-based education."

As reported, "U.S. science educators have endorsed the organization's award-winning content, which National Geographic also distributes."

According to **The Tennessean**, at least one Tennessee legislator has tried to connect the "Baby Olivia" video and the state bill to the Alabama Supreme Court ruling that said frozen embryos created during the in-vitro fertilization (IVF) process are to be included as children under the Wrongful Death of a Minor Act.

"This bill has got nothing to do with IVF. It is strictly looking at a presentation of a scientifically accurate computer-generated video or ultrasound that shows human life and development from conception through birth, and it doesn't get into IVF at all," Bulso said.

Rep. Gloria Johnson, an opponent of the bill, called the video “deceptive and problematic for a young audience,” adding, “It’s designed to manipulate the emotions of the viewers...” However, Rep. Chris Todd noted, “I was trained as a biologist, and [“Baby Olivia” is] definitely accurate. It’s incredibly accurate. We have a lot of things in our society that are protected ... in the environmental world and animal world.”

The “Baby Olivia” video has been reviewed and endorsed by OB-GYNs and other medical professionals, including Dr. David Bolender, PhD, Cell Biology, Neurobiology & Anatomy, Medical College of Wisconsin; Dr. Donna Harrison of the American Association of Pro-Life Obstetricians and Gynecologists; Michelle Cretella, MD, Executive Director of the American College of Pediatricians; and Jeffrey Barrows, DO, MA, Senior VP Bioethics and Public Policy for the Christian Medical & Dental Associations.


