And the very next week we heard another parable regarding the ever abounding, overflowing grace of God.

It is truly through the grace and mercy given to us by God Himself that we do have peace, the only way that we have peace. It is through the blood shed of the very Son of God, His willing sacrifice, His atoning work for you, that you have peace. You are no longer an enemy of God. You no longer have the wrath of God upon you because of your sin, both actual and original. The Son of

God came down to earth, to suffer and die upon the cross, to bodily rise again on the third day, to bring you this peace. It is a peace that we have with God because of Jesus' work, and it is a peace that we share with one another as well, as brothers and sisters in Christ.

Live each day in the peace that has been graciously and mercifully given to you by your Savior Jesus Christ. May we live with one another in that peace that has been paid for fully and secured eternally by Christ, for we are brought together and kept together by the work of God. Oh, and by the way, did you notice how each sermon ends? The peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Peace given yet again, which by the way are not my words but from Phil. 4:7! It is truly a peace that transcends all understanding. A peace given out of love for you and for me, comprehended only through the work of the Holy Spirit and given freely by grace through faith apart from any of our works.



Stewardship in the First Commandment

The greatest gift that Martin Luther gave to us was his Small Catechism. The word “enchiridion” is part of the original title of this work. This is the Greek word for “handbook.” The Small Catechism is a handbook of the Bible. All the basic knowledge that a Christian needs to understand the faith and live a godly life has been taken from the Bible and distilled into this beautiful little book of Christian piety.

Luther starts with the Ten Commandments.

The First Commandment:

You shall have no other gods.

What does this mean? We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things. (SC I)

We have a God above us. He is the Lord God and we are not. He is Almighty and in control. He is righteous and good. And therefore, we should fear Him.

This God is also our heavenly Father. He wants us to be saved. He does not want us to suffer His just wrath. He has provided salvation for us in His Son, Jesus Christ. And therefore, we should love Him.

Our heavenly Father will never leave us nor forsake us. He has promised as much — and the Bible shows us that He always keeps His promises. So, we should trust Him.

In the Large Catechism, Luther explains how money and possessions form one of the greatest temptations against the First Commandment:

This I must unfold somewhat more plainly, that it may be understood and perceived by ordinary examples of the contrary. Many a one thinks that he has God and everything in abundance when he has money and possessions; he trusts in them and boasts of them with such firmness and assurance as to care for no one. Lo, such a man also has a god, Mammon by name, i.e., money and possessions, on which he sets all his heart, and which is also the most common idol on earth. He who has money and possessions feels secure, and is joyful and undismayed as though he were sitting in the midst of Paradise. On the other hand, he who has none doubts and is despondent, as though he knew of no God. For very few are to be found who are of good cheer, and who neither mourn nor complain if they have not Mammon. This [care and desire for money] sticks and clings to our nature, even to the grave. (LC I 5–9)

These words of Dr. Luther should call us to repentance; sometimes, we live and act like we don't have a Father in heaven. We seek our comfort and peace outside of His gracious promises. But we do have a Father in heaven. He does love us. All His promises are true. And the Lord will surely provide. If that is our belief, then our outward lives will reflect our belief in our acts of generosity and mercy. We will see money and possessions not as gods but rather as tools for doing God's work.


Religious Liberty: Free to be Faithful: A religious liberty education and awareness campaign from The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod

Equipping Lutherans to be gospel-motivated voices for Life

[How to Use Your Gospel-Motivated Voice For Life](#) by Pastor Michael Salemink

Lutherans For Life is celebrating our forty-fifth anniversary with a new logo! Maybe a picture's worth a thousand words. But a single image can't say everything about our sanctity of life, community and ministry. Still, it can say something important.

Our previous logo has served well. Many recognize the blue "L" wrapped around a descending dove: **"It is the Spirit who gives life ... the words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life"** (John 6:63). This graphic faithfully communicated grace and peace. Now that *Roe vs. Wade* has gone away, the decades-old emblem has earned its retirement, too. An era of print information gave it birth, and we have since entered the digital age.

The updated Lutherans For Life insignia keeps the sky-blue legacy coloring. It evokes the joy and hope of our sacred vocation to receive life as gift and privilege, no matter what age, appearance, or ability. At the center, of course, stands the cross of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Every human life has purpose because this God creates, redeems, and calls (Isaiah 43:1-2) each one as His own precious treasure from fertilization to forever.

Like the roots and limbs of a tree, the cross branches out into an EKG tracing. Its linear symbol for heartbeat and lifeblood (Leviticus 17:14) connects the whole course from the embryo in the mother's belly to the final breath the Father bestows. More than simply surprise pregnancies or terminal diagnoses, the sanctity of human life intersects a spectrum of issues and situations – anywhere deception pressures neighbors to view death as a solution to difficulty.

The horizon behind (or is it ahead?) takes the shape of a heart. This background indicates the courage and compassion of our Gospel-motivated message and mission. We speak God's truth and show Christ's love. A contemporary typeface shares our organization's identity (simplified and stabilized without serifs, so that it reads clearer for persons with visual impairments and on the condensed scales of mobile devices).

We've put a lot of reflection and effort into this little icon. It reminds us of how the Almighty Maker invests human beings with so much worth and purpose of His own. We eagerly welcome the new opportunities and continuing responsibilities it will encounter. And we hope it sparks the same impressions for you and everybody we reach and serve—equipping Lutherans and their neighbors to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life!

[Texas Sues Planned Parenthood to Recover Millions in Medicaid Funds](#) by Cassy Fiano-Chesser

The state of Texas is attempting to recover Medicaid funds given to Planned Parenthood during a years-long legal fight, before the abortion giant was eventually cut from the state program.

In 2015, Planned Parenthood was the subject of an undercover investigation, which purported to show that some affiliates and employees of the corporation were participating in the trafficking of aborted body parts, which violates Federal law. By 2016, Texas filed to remove Planned Parenthood as a Medicaid provider. After a lengthy legal battle, the state of Texas succeeded. Attorney General Ken Paxton then sought to recover the funds dispensed to Planned Parenthood during that legal battle.

U.S. District Judge Matthew Kacsmaryk, who suspended FDA approval of mifepristone earlier this year, presided over the lawsuit regarding the reimbursement on Tuesday. He did not issue a ruling right away. "This baseless case is an active effort to shut down Planned Parenthood health centers," Planned Parenthood Federation of America president Alexis McGill Johnson said in a statement. Yet Paxton said Planned Parenthood wrongly took money to which they knew they were not entitled. "It is unthinkable that Planned Parenthood would continue to take advantage of funding knowing they were not entitled to keep it," he said in a statement announcing the lawsuit last year. "I will not allow them to benefit from this abhorrent conduct after they were caught violating medical standards and lying to law enforcement."

In addition to being accused of breaking the law regarding the sale of human body parts, Planned Parenthood was also fined in 2013 for fraudulently overbilling Texas Medicaid. "Planned Parenthood Gulf Coast improperly billed the Texas Medicaid program for products and services that were never actually rendered, not medically necessary, and were not covered by the Medicaid program – and were therefore not eligible for reimbursement," Texas Governor Greg Abbott said in a statement at the time.

Texas wasn't the only victim of Planned Parenthood's alleged swindling, however. In Wisconsin, the Department of Health and Human Services found that as many as two-thirds of Planned Parenthood Wisconsin's Medicaid payments were fraudulent, after auditing eight family planning facilities. Planned Parenthood had the highest percentage of over billing. Planned Parenthood of the Heartland — now called Planned Parenthood North Central States — was also accused of committing Medicaid fraud, including patient abuses, the "unbundling" of services, and fraudulently tallying patients. A report from the U.S. House of Representatives also found that Planned Parenthood abused taxpayer funds, giving money to their political action fund for lobbying, spending millions of dollars on travel, and spending hundreds of thousands of dollars on themed fundraisers and lavish parties.

It remains unclear how Kacsmaryk will rule in this case, but what *is* clear is that Planned Parenthood has demonstrated a lack of prudence with taxpayer dollars.
